I used figurative language through the poem to give the reader a better visual image of physical things in the story (the rain, the sun, coworkers, the texture of the clothes the narrator wore). I showed the emotion of the narrator not directly but through the contrast of how the narrator felt about the things around him at the beginning of the story and the end. I also used parallelism with the use of a variety of short verbs at the beginning of every line in the first stanza. In addition, I also used parallelism with the alternation of The and Tell in the very beginning of the second stanza. I mimicked the parallelism in the poems we read from Jimmy Santiago further so with the use of commas at the end of each line only using periods to emphasise very specific lines. I used the repetition of temperature in the story when describing the weather and feeling of certain objects. I also used repetition with the use of words that are associated with uncomfortability in the first stanza while then using words related with comfort in the second stanza. For example, in the first paragraph I used words/phrases such as freezing, steel, pressed like a board, slog, and boring; in the second paragraph I used words/phrases such as unchained, gleaming, shining brightly, comfy clothes, and "weight off your shoulders". The attitude about life I wanted to give the reader a sense of in this poem is the idea that sometimes you have to realize that something isn't good for you, whether it's a job, people in your life, bad habits, etc. The main take-away for the reader is that not everything you try will make you happy in life and you need to experiment to find your own personal path in life.
